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Coyotes in Lincolnshire



The April 2007 Village NewsLetter included a comprehensive insert on Coyotes. This five page document explained in detail issues surrounding the coyote. Recently the Village has received calls from concerned residents regarding coyote sightings and activities. We are closing in on the mating season which typically occurs in February. The pups are born 62 to 65 days later in April. This period of time is when coyote behavior can become aggressive.

It is vitally important to eliminate all food sources out of doors. This includes fallen fruit, including pumpkins, over-filled bird feeders, domestic dog and cat food, unsecured garbage, etc. Once a coyote has secured a food source it will continue to aggressively return to that area.

Take ownership of your own pets. Be responsible not to leave any pet or small child unattended. The coyote is here to stay. It is up to us to learn to live in harmony with them as with all wild animals.

If you observe an aggressive, fearless coyote please report it immediately by calling the Lincolnshire Police dispatch center at 847-883-9900.

Log Cabin Update

Demolition of the log cabins along Route 22 is scheduled to start as soon as the weather turns cold and the ground freezes. During demolition work, the hiking and recreation path in front of the cabins will be closed at times to pedestrian traffic for the safety of pedestrians and workers. Closures will be limited to when the contractor is working on or near the path, or is crossing the path with heavy equipment or trucks. Due to the nature of the work, the Village will be unable to provide additional advance notice of these closures. The contractor will place signs indicating that the path is closed.

The cabins are expected to be completely removed by April 1st. For more information regarding this project, contact Village Engineer, Jennifer Hughes.

Recent Board Action

At its Regular Village Board Meeting of January 14th, the Village Board of Trustees:

Did you Know...

If you are considering installing a gazebo or any other permitted detached accessory structure in your rear yard, the Village has specific guidelines that need to be followed before these structures can be built. The Village defines a detached, accessory structure as an accessory structure surrounded by open space, which is not physically attached to the principal structure on the lot by means of a common foundation.

Before construction can begin, a completed Building Permit Application needs to be submitted to the Village for review to make sure that the proposed structure is compliant with the Village Code. Codes pertaining to detached accessory structures can be found online at the Village website at www.village.lincolshire.il.us, under Chapter 3, section 6-3, or a copy of the Code can be obtained at the Village Hall.

County Encourages Citizens to Get Informed

Transportation is a top strategic priority of the Lake County Board and the County recognizes that part of the solution has to be addressed in Springfield. The County is asking state leaders to approve a capital program that adequately funds all forms of state transportation. Citizens can let their voices be heard on this critical issue by sending an email message to their state legislators, Governor Blagojevich, and state legislative leaders encouraging them to dedicate funding for roads, bridges, and transit across Illinois. Natures Edge - Don't Feed the Animals!



Did you know that it is against the law to feed wildlife such as deer or to have a feeding station on your property? The law states:

It shall be illegal to make available food, salt, mineral blocks, or other products for ingestion by wild deer or other wildlife in areas where wild deer are present. Exempted from this Section are the following: a) elevated bird/squirrel feeders providing seed, grain, fruit, worms or suet for birds or squirrels located within 100 feet of a dwelling devoted to human occupancy;

Some people in the Village believe they are providing a valuable service to wildlife by providing food for them. Some just want to see wildlife in their yard so they put out food to attract them. This is dangerous for the wildlife and could be dangerous for you.

1. Chronic Wasting Disease is a deadly disease spread by blood and saliva. It is similar to Mad Cow Disease in cattle. It is a neurological disease that produces lesions in the brains of infected animals causing them to behave erratically, makes them lethargic and eventually kills them. Areas where animals share food is a perfect breeding ground for this disease and is certainly not something you want to create. Like Mad Cow Disease, this disease has not been determined to affect humans but the research is not conclusive.
2. Feeding stations attract a variety of wildlife. Over the past year, there have been a number of issues related to coyotes. Pets have been killed and people have called about aggressive coyote behavior. These animals eat just about anything. They will come to feeding stations and eat whatever is present – this would include bird feeders if they are not secured and elevated. As a result they begin to claim territory and will act in a dominant manner to protect and defend their territory from other animals who may wish to venture in. This would include family pets.
3. Wildlife needs to forage for their food – it is their nature. It also keeps them independent. When you place a feeding station they will come to the easiest food source and not forage. It makes them dependent upon you and they lose their ability to forage on their own. What happens to these animals when you are not stocking the feeding station? What if you move, go on vacation, etc.
4. Often feeding stations are located in areas where they are easily visible (efforts by homeowners to see wildlife in their yards). This is true for animals too. If you are drawing wildlife to a common area, where they come regularly, predators will pick up on that too. Unwittingly you are providing a bait station for other wildlife where they can be attacked and eaten right on your property – that is probably not what you were expecting to view.

Wild animals are just that wild animals. They are not our pets. We must respect their nature and try not to adversely impact their lives. If you have a feeding station on your property you must remove it immediately. If you know of a neighbor who has a feeding station, speak to them and tell them they are required to remove it. If they do not, contact the Village. Anyone with a prohibited feeding station is in violation of the law and subject to a fine.

Candidate Signage

The Village Code regulates the size of political signs. The maximum size for political signs is six square feet, which is the size of a standard 2 x 3 foot sign, and it cannot be any higher than four feet off the ground.



All political signs must be displayed no more than thirty-six days prior and removed within two days after an election. Since the waste haulers come through the Village on Wednesday, February 6th, it's a good idea to take the signs out of your yard and put them at the curb at the same time you put out your waste and recycleables.

Signs must be placed on private property with the consent of the homeowner. Private property typically begins fifteen feet from the roadway. Rights-of-way along roads such as Riverwoods Road, Route 22, and Milwaukee Avenue are not private property. Any signage along these roadways must be placed on private property with the consent of the property owner. **Any signage not meeting this criteria will be removed by the Village staff.**

One Hundred Year Flood Defined

“Does a 100-year flood occur once every 100-years?” is a question that we hear frequently when people discuss floodplains. By definition, a 100-year flood, also known as the “base flood,” is a flood that has a one percent (1%) chance of occurring in any given year (for other probabilities, see the table below). The area susceptible to flooding during the base flood is called the Special Flood Hazard Area, or floodplain. The elevation of the water for a flood event of a given probability is determined by engineers by studying rainfall intensities, stream and river cross-sections, and topography.

Studies suggest that during the 30-year life of a typical mortgage, a structure located within the 100-year floodplain has a 26 percent (26%) chance of experiencing flooding but a four percent (4%) chance of experiencing a fire. This statistic is the reason why flood insurance coverage is mandatory for structures whose mortgage is backed by the federal government. Remember, your general homeowners insurance policy DOES NOT cover losses from floods. Therefore, even if you do not live in the Special Flood Hazard Area, you should consider purchasing flood insurance.

ICE DAMMING

WHAT CAUSES ICE DAMMING AND WHY IS IT A PROBLEM?

Many residents had the misfortune last winter of having to deal with a problem known as ice damming. Ice damming is the accumulation of ice along the gutters at the roof eaves. The warm sunlight heats the roof, which causes the snow on your roof to melt from the bottom up. When the melted snow runs down to the frozen gutters, it re-freezes in the form of ice. As this occurs, the ice continues to work its way back up the roof. This cycle will continue to worsen, because the snow on the roof that has not melted yet, acts as an insulator for the ice by not allowing the sun to melt it. Finally, while the ice continues to melt, ice and water begin to work their way under the shingles, through the roof paper, and eventually into your house. This is why it was so important last winter to remove the snow from the first three (3) or four (4) feet of your roof. This act allowed the sun to melt the ice at the roofs eaves, before it could work its way back up the roof!

HOW CAN I REPAIR THIS PROBLEM, SO IT DOESN'T HAPPEN AGAIN?

Unfortunately, there is not a 100% guarantee on anything; however, steps can be taken to reduce the chances of a reoccurrence. First, contact a state licensed roofing contractor that you're comfortable with, based on his qualifications, recommendations, etc. Next, request that the contractor acquire a roofing permit from the Village of Lincolnshire, (roofing permits are issued immediately upon completion of a short application). The contractor will be required to provide a copy of their state issued license, some minor information regarding the project, and a \$40.00 inspection/permit fee. Have your contractor procure the permit, as this will make them responsible for their work.

When a roofing contractor works on a roofing project, they usually simultaneously remove the existing shingles and replace them with the new shingles. This makes it nearly impossible to provide thorough inspections without delaying the project, which would drive up the cost of the work. Although the Village does everything it can to ensure proper installation, we cannot be on the job site from a project's start to finish.

We suggest adding the following requirements to your agreement with the contractor, to ensure maximum protection:

1. Replace all roof sheathing and flashing that has any indications of damage.
2. Install a material known as ice shield along the bottom edges of the roof. The Village's Building Code requires that the ice shield extend from the roof edge upward, until it extends a minimum of twenty-four (24) inches past the exterior wall. This is determined by drawing an imaginary line from the outside edge of the wall vertically through the roof line. The ice shield needs to extend twenty-four (24) inches, past that point, upward toward the peak of the roof.
3. Overlap the roofing paper at least eight (8) inches at all points.
4. State that all manufacturer's installation requirements and instructions must be followed.

These are only a few of the requirements that need to be met when repairing a roof. However, if the contractor does these things properly, the chances of ice-damming will be greatly reduced.

One last reminder, which applies to all building permits. It's a good idea to hold a portion of the final payment for the work completed, until you receive a final inspection from the Village. This is your last chance to ensure that the job was done properly and/or to express outstanding concerns that you had with the project completion. Holding the final portion of the project fee will provide an increased incentive for the contractor to perform the work to your satisfaction.
