Tornado Warning Sirens

On Saturday, June 7th, the Lincolnshire Police set off the Tornado Warning Sirens. These sirens are only set off when a tornado is imminent or has been sighted.

Lincolnshire residents should immediately take shelter and turn on the emergency weather station on their radios. The ALL CLEAR will be given by the Emergency Weather Radio Network, not the Police Department. A second siren indicates a second tornado, not an all clear.



Remember, you may have only a few minutes to react after a Tornado Warning Siren is set off.

The safe area in your house should have flashlights, drinking water, and a battery operated radio ready for this type of emergency. Weather warning radios are available at most electronic stores.

When the tornado sirens are activated, you should immediately gather your family and go to your safe area.

Please do not call the Police Department for instructions. Over 100 calls flooded both the emergency and non-emergency telephone lines in the Telecommunication Center and there were three other 9-1-1 emergencies occurring simultaneously.

Our community was lucky and the tornado(s) touched down a few miles northwest of Lincolnshire. As residents we must use this close call as training for the future. The Warning Sirens are here to give us a few minutes to save our lives and calling the police department wastes that precious time to find safety. Every family should have a pre-arranged safe area in their home for these emergencies.

Emergency Supply Kit

Take the time to set aside the following basic supplies in case of an emergency:

Battery-operated radio and extra batteries; one gallon of water per person; flashlight and extra batteries; first aid kit and manual; battery operated lantern and extra batteries; prescription medication you take every day as well as non-prescription medication such as aspirin; large garbage bags and ties; portable container for important family documents; cash; fire extinguisher; matches in a waterproof container; blankets; canned food; hand-operated can opener; durable shoes for each family member; basic tools (wrench, hammer); and utility gloves.

Recent Board Action

At its Regular Village Board Meeting of May 27th, the Village Board of Trustees:

- Approved a Fiscal Year 2008 Budget Amendment 2 regarding Community Development.
- Approved an Ordinance Granting Variation to Permit an Extension to October 1, 2009 to Connect to the Village's Potable Water System and Sanitary Sewer System for the Structure Located at 20 Westwood Lane.
- Approved an Ordinance Amending Title 3 of the Village Code - Prohibiting Solicitors in the Roadway.
- Approved a Site Plan, Building Elevations, Building Materials and Colors, Landscape Plan, Rooftop Equipment Plan and Site Lighting; an Ordinance amending Ordinance No. 04-1936-52, approving an Area of Special Sign Control designation, to approve a comprehensive sign package; and an Ordinance approving a Plat of Resubdivision, known as ECD Subdivision Unit 1, Second Resubdivision, to subdivide the detention outlot for the City Park development, to create a second buildable lot, all relating to the development of a seven story, 138-room aloft hotel, at City Park of Lincolnshire.

At its Regular Village Board Meeting of June 9th, the Village Board of Trustees:

- Approved a professional services agreement with Hampton, Lenzini and Renwick, Inc., Elgin, IL, for the Design of Engineering Documents for

Olde Half Day Road Rehabilitation and Streetscape Project in an amount not to exceed \$51,934.

- Approved an agreement for the Dedication of a Hiking and Recreation Path Easement along the Vernon Area Public Library site.
- Approved a renewal agreement for the Regulation of Traffic and Parking at the Sutton Place Townhomes Complex.
- Approved an Intergovernmental Agreement regarding the Rivershore Nature Center with School District #103.
- Approved an Ordinance Amending an existing Annexation Agreement and an Ordinance Amending and establishing a special use for a Planned Unit Development (PUD) for Unit 1 of the Lincolnshire Center for Business, in the B2 Zoning District, with zoning exceptions, to permit a seven story, 138-room aloft hotel, at City Park of Lincolnshire.
- Approved an Ordinance Amending an existing Annexation Agreement and Granting a partial termination and release of an existing Annexation Agreement, for the portion over the parcel located at 15730 Aptakisic Road (Lietzau Property); and approved a Site Plan, Building Elevations, Building Materials and Colors, Landscape Plan, Rooftop Equipment Plan, Site Lighting, and Signage, both subject to the withholding of approval on the monument sign and the monument sign landscaping to permit the

development of a four-story, 169,800-square foot office building, located at 535-555 Aptakisic Road for Lincolnshire Bridge LLC.

- Approved an Ordinance Granting a Variation, to permit off-street parking in a required front yard and corner side yard; approved the Granting of a Utility Easement over the parcel located at 15730 Aptakisic Road; approved a preliminary Plat of Vacation and dedication of Utility Easements; approved a preliminary Plat of Dedication for right-of-way; and approved an Ordinance approving a preliminary Plat of Subdivision to create one consolidated lot for the development of a four-story, 169,800-square foot office building, located at 535-555 Aptakisic Road for Lincolnshire Bridge LLC.
- Approved the waiving of the siting requirement for the Household Chemical Collection by SWALCO and the Lincolnshire-Riverwoods Fire Protection District.

Water Meter Reading

The Village of Lincolnshire's Water Department will be reading inside water meters for single family homes located north of Route 22 as well as properties located west of the Des Plaines River.



Inspections will be performed from 8:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, beginning July 1st, over a period of two months. Inside meter readings are taken every third year to verify that the inside meter matches the outside meter readings. To eliminate the need to enter each house quarterly, the outside meter is read to determine the owner's water usage. This program assures you the accuracy of the meter readings.

This program also includes a mandated inspection of your plumbing system and sump pumps. The average time required per property is about ten minutes.

Spring Lake Beach Hours

Spring Lake Beach will be open between June 2nd and August 19th. Lifeguards are on duty daily from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00



p.m. Swimming is allowed from sunrise to sunset. However, when no lifeguards are on duty, and you want to swim, it will be at your own risk. When lifeguards are off duty, swimmers age 16 and under must be accompanied by an adult. When there is a rain event, it is recommended that you wait to swim in the lake for 24 to 48 hours because of the possibility of bacteria in the water. The Building

The Building Square is a quarterly feature, in which the Building Division of the Community Development Department will present information intended to provide useful advice to our residents about building related topics. Our goal is to provide you with information that can assist you with building projects you may undertake in the future, to help understand why problems may have occurred in the past, and to relay some of the experiences and responsibilities our division faces throughout the year. Should you have any questions or comments regarding building related topics, please send them to us and we may use your query in one of our quarterly features.

Did You get a Final Inspection for that Permit?

The Village of Lincolnshire processes approximately 450 Building and Site Work permits a year. Additionally, there are almost as many projects actively under construction or in process at any one time. As a condition of every Building Permit and Site Work Permit, a final inspection is required. Given the number of active permits, it is important that the permit applicant contact the Village to have those final inspections scheduled as this benefits all parties involved with the project.

For the homeowner, it provides an assurance that the work performed has been done in accordance with the approved plans. It provides the peace of mind that the work was performed to the minimum required safety standards to not only protect the current homeowner, but for future homeowners as well. Additionally, the homeowner may choose to withhold final payment until a final inspection has been performed. This allows the homeowner an opportunity to ensure that all the contractor's work has been performed as required. Remember, the costs of the required inspections are calculated into the permit fees, so you will pay nothing extra for a final inspection.

The contractor also benefits from a code compliant job. Good contractors will use their past performance to "sell" themselves to potential clients. Projects closed out properly, give them the tools they need to accomplish this easily. Additionally, they build a good working relationship with the Village and gain a good understanding of specific Village Codes and processes, which tends to allow their projects to run more smoothly.

Lastly, the entire Village benefits from properly performed and inspected projects by having the assurance that the construction occurring within the community is being performed to a nationally recognized safety standard. This ensures that property values reflect the standards set by the community.

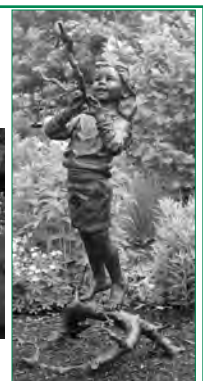
Congratulations and Thank You Garden Club!

Natures Edge



Summer is a beautiful time of year in Lincolnshire. In addition, to our beautiful wooded private properties, there are many wonderful parks, paths and natural areas to walk, bike and play. In order to enjoy our summer months, it is important to know how to protect ourselves from sun and insects.

Sun: Sun screen should be a daily habit – just as you dress yourself each day, you should apply sun screen. Sun screen is now included in many moisturizers and body lotions. Unprotected exposure to sun can not only prematurely age you, but it can cause skin cancer.

The Skin Cancer Foundation provides the following tips to guard against sunburn and damage:

- Seek shade – especially between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- Do not burn.
- Avoid tanning and UV tanning booths.
- Use a sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher every day.
- Apply 2 ounce (2 tablespoons) of sunscreen to your entire body at least 30 minutes prior to going outside.
- Reapply sunscreen every two hours.
- Be sure to cover up with clothing including a wide brimmed hat and UV-blocking sunglasses.
- Keep newborns out of the sun. Sunscreens should be used on babies over the age of six months.
- Examine your skin head-to-toe every month.
- See your physician every year for a professional skin exam.

Bee or Wasp Stings: Another concern when being out of doors is the opportunity to be bitten or stung by insects. If proper precautions are taken, this unpleasant experience can be avoided.

If threatened, bees and wasps will sting. Bees and wasps inject a venom through their stingers. If a stinger is left in the skin, the stinger should be removed as soon as possible because venom continues to be pumped through the stinger into the skin. Do not use a tweezer or your fingers to remove the stinger. Doing so will push more venom into the skin. Instead, use a butter knife or edge of a credit card to brush the stinger out of the skin.

Mosquito or Tick Bites: While the risks of disease are low, care should be taken to avoid bites from mosquitoes or ticks. When these insects bite they release a chemical that is an anticoagulant. This enables them to feed on your blood. This can be avoided if insect repellent is applied prior to going out of doors.

Care should be taken to inspect your body – daily – from head to toe for ticks. At least 36 to 48 hours of feeding is required for a tick, if it carries a disease, to transmit the bacterium. If a tick has imbedded itself in your skin, use a tweezer to grasp the tick as close to the skin surface as possible. Pull backwards gently – do not jerk or twist. Try not to squeeze or crush the body of the tick. Doing so could cause the tick to regurgitate fluids into the skin. Disinfect the skin and hands thoroughly with soap and water. If the head or mouth parts remain in the skin, leave them alone. They will come loose on their own - much like a sliver.

Mosquito bites can be very irritating but they can also make you sick. Last year 101 cases of West Nile virus were diagnosed in Illinois. Efforts should be taken to protect your skin by using insect repellent, but you also need to eliminate opportunities for mosquitoes to breed around your home. Eliminate any standing water, i.e. bird baths, gutters, ponds, flower pots, wading pools, and any other receptacle.

If bitten or stung, do not scratch the area because of risk of infection.

To relieve the pain or itch, you can apply a paste made of baking soda and water. You can also apply unseasoned meat tenderizer, containing papain to the bite or sting. In addition, there are many commercial products you can buy to relieve the itch or sting from insects.

For an enjoyable summer, clearly “an ounce of prevention is worth more than a pound of cure!”

Summer Road Construction

The Village has already completed its annual street resurfacing project and installation of the Route 22 bike path from Westminster Way to the east side of Wood Creek Courts. The reconstruction of Olde Half Day Road and the installation of a new traffic signal on Milwaukee Avenue is underway.

There is still plenty of construction left to be completed this summer. In August, the Village Hall parking lot will be resurfaced for the first time since its initial installation. Then, in September, the Spring Lake Park parking lot will be reconstructed.

IDOT is scheduled to start work on the Route 22 bridge over the Tollway later this summer. Watch this space for additional information.

Heads Up - Fall Branch Collection is Coming!

As you are completing your spring clean-up and throughout the summer, keep in mind the Village will be sponsoring a Fall Branch Collection again this year. The collection will begin the week of September 22nd. Only cut branches or trees smaller than six inches in diameter will be collected. Improving the Quality of Stormwater in the Village

Stormwater runoff is the water that runs off surfaces, such as rooftops, paved streets, highways, and parking lots during rain events and snow melt. It can also come from hard grassy surfaces, such as golf courses, lawns, parks, and play fields. As the water flows, it collects debris, soil, garbage, pet waste, chemicals, salt and hazardous wastes. The stormwater quality in the village can deteriorate due to the accumulation of these materials.

Water quality is important to protect fish, wildlife, aquatic life habitats, aesthetic value, and most important, public health. Please look around your property to see what items may be contributing to poor water quality. Do not dump any materials into storm sewers, inlets, drainage ditches, wetlands, or rivers.

The Village, in partnership with its residents and the Lake County Stormwater Management Commission, has developed a program to improve the quality of stormwater in the Village. The program is designed to comply with the requirements of the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES), ensuring that stormwater remains clean to the maximum practical extent.

The Floodplain's Natural Benefits

A floodplain is the low-lying area adjacent to streams, rivers, lakes, and, in some cases, even low spots that do not normally hold water. It provides a wonderful habitat for many species of wildlife and plants. The floodplain also serves as a natural buffer which can absorb water during periods of heavy rain. For example, the golf course at Marriott's Lincolnshire Resort is a fine playground in dry weather, but when the banks of the Des Plaines River overflow, the golf course serves as a holding area for flood waters. Similarly, the ponds at the Tri-State International Office Complex provide both recreational opportunities and flood attenuation along the Chicago River.

Due to the benefits of floodplains, the Village has adopted special regulations to govern construction in floodplains.

12. Use a reusable water bottle instead of buying a new bottle each time.
13. Call the 800 number listed on unwanted catalogues (as many as you can) and ask them to stop sending you the catalogue.
14. Donate unwanted clothing or household items.
15. Participate in a Household Chemical Waste Collection Event.
16. Recycle unwanted electronic equipment (See SWALCO.org for locations).
17. Turn your thermostat up a couple of degrees during the summer months.
18. Turn your hot water thermostat down a couple of degrees.
19. Take the train downtown - for one trip this summer.
20. Buy products that state they are not made with "volatile organic compounds", i.e. cleaning products, paint, carpet, etc.
21. Take your car to the carwash instead of washing it in the driveway.
22. Take your own bags to the grocery store.
23. Check your trash for products that could be recycled – put them in the recycling bin.
24. Direct your gutters to your yard instead of into the sewer.
25. Close your blinds during the heat of the day.
